Order of Service

In preparation for the service, we invite your quiet prayers and ask that you please silence your cell phone.

This evening's service is a form of Lessons & Carols intended to mark the beginning of the Advent season. This unique and inspiring service, based on similar services at Durham Cathedral, Salisbury Cathedral, and Liverpool Cathedral, includes beautiful music sung in various locations of the church. The service begins in darkness, and as the flicker of candlelight fills the church, the story of God's salvation history unfolds in word and music. The singing from various locations in the church (West, East, North and South), as well as the growing illumination of the church, recalls the coming of Jesus as the Light of the World. Our prayer is that this time of worship will offer a measure of God's peace and quietude during this holy season of the year.

The Candlelighting Liturgy

It is not ourselves that we proclaim; we proclaim Christ Jesus as Lord, and ourselves as his servants. For the same God who said, "Out of darkness let light shine," has caused his light to shine within us, to give the light of revelation – the revelation of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. *2 Corinthians 4:5-6 (alt.)*

If I say, "Surely the darkness will cover me, and the light around me turn to night," darkness is not dark to you, O Lord; the night is as bright as the day; darkness and light to you are both alike. *Psalm 139:10 11*

The Lord be with you. **And also with you.** Let us pray. Grant us, Lord, the lamp of charity which never fails, that it may burn in us and shed its light on those around us, and that by its brightness we may have a vision of that holy City, where dwells the true and never-failing Light, Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

> The congregation's candles are now lighted. These candles should remain lighted until after the Fifth Lesson is read. As you are offered the light, please tip your unlighted candle to receive the flame. As you pass the light to your neighbor, be careful not to tip a lighted candle.

The Bidding

Beloved in Christ, as we await the great festival of Christmas, let us prepare ourselves so that we may be shown its true meaning. Let us hear in Holy Scripture how the prophets of Israel foretold that God would visit and redeem the waiting people. Let us rejoice, in our carols and hymns, that the good purpose of God is being mightily fulfilled. Let us celebrate the promise that our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, will bring all peoples and all things into the glory of God's eternal kingdom. The blind receive their sight, and the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have the gospel preached to them. But first, let us pray for the world that God so loves, for those who have not heard the good news of God, or who do not believe it; for those who walk in darkness and the shadow of death and for the Church in this place and everywhere, that it may in pure joy lift up the light of the love of God. These prayers and praises let us humbly offer to God, in the words that Christ himself taught us.

The Lord's Prayer (In unison)

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil; For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Officiant alone continues: The Almighty God bless us with his grace; Christ give us the joys of everlasting life; and unto the fellowship of the citizens above, may the King of Angels bring us all. **Amen.**

Thus we were heirs to endless woes till God the Lord did interpose; and so a promise soon did run: that he would redeem us by his Son.

At at this season of the year our blest Redeemer did appear, he here did live, and here did preach, and many thousands he did teach.

Thus he in love to us behaved, to show us how we must be saved; and if you want to know the way, be pleased to hear what he did say:
